COBEC MINI-GRANT SUPPORTS AVIRTUAL STUDENT EXCHANGE PILOT

With help from a COBEC mini-grant, Bossier Parish Community College and Galen University are partnering to provide a Virtual Exchange experience for students from both colleges who may otherwise not have the means to travel.

As a lead-in to the project, the two colleges connected through simultaneous art exhibitions from faculty or students at both institutions. During his site visit to Louisiana last fall, Kirkland Smith, Galen's project lead, shared Belize student and faculty artwork to be exhibited in BPCC's art gallery. The show is concurrently on exhibit at BPCC and includes more than 45 drawings, photographs and paintings.

In January, Kelly McDade, project lead for BPCC, traveled to Galen University while in Belize for the COBEC conference to meet students and staff supporting the initiative and to continue preparations for the spring Virtual Exchange Pilot. She brought seven of her own artworks now on display at Galen.

The Student Exchange Pilot is on track to launch March 19 and run through April 13. Eighteen students, nine from Louisiana and nine from throughout Belize, will participate in joint classes and partner across their cultures to create and present projects in a virtual environment.

McDade and Smith agreed that the face-to-face pre-planning meetings, experiencing each other's hometown cultures, and collaborating in real-time well-prepared them for the spring rollout. McDade noted, "we are determined to help grow this initiative in the future and include professors from other fields, with the goal of building a larger COBEC virtual exchange model."

Bossier Parish Community College and Galen University thank COBEC for the mini-grant which helped to bring this unique vision to life.



MURRAY STATE'S EDUCATION ABROAD PROGRAM IN BELIZE CELEBRATES 10TH ANNIVERSARY

In 2017, the College of Education and Human Services at Murray State University celebrated the 10th anniversary of its Belize International Teaching Experience, a three-week education abroad program that allows students to broaden their world-views by spending a portion of their student-teaching requirement in Belizean schools. The program has been conducted in collaboration with two Belizean junior colleges in northern Belize—Corozal Junior College and Centro Escolar Mexico Junior College.

"It's an opportunity to see a part of Central America that is challenged economically yet recognizes the value of its youth," said Dr. David Whaley, dean of the College of Education and Human Services. "Our student teachers get to experience this firsthand by living it 24/7 for three weeks."

Since the program's inception in 2007, more than 100 Murray State student teachers have taught in Corozal, Belize. Students visit during both the spring and fall semesters with the most recent trip spanning Nov. 11 through Dec. 4 and including four students. Another group will be setting off on their Belizean adventure April 14 through May 7, 2018.

While abroad, students teach five days each week and spend the weekends exploring the natural wonders of the country. Typical excursions include exploring Mayan ruins, zip-lining, cave tubing, snorkeling and visiting local islands. Though a great deal of fun is had by the students, they also learn to cope with certain challenges that come along with living in another country and experiencing a different culture.

Many thanks to COBEC for awarding Bossier Parish Community College a \$1,000 mini-grant that served as matching funds for on-site, online design workshops for three Belize junior colleges. Our gracious hosts Dr. Karen Martinez, Marie Young, Fermin Magana and Jeanne Link helped plan and coordinate workshop events held this winter.

In mid-February, BPCC's Allison Martin traveled to Dangriga and San Iganacio, Belize to present day-long online course design workshops for 60 faculty and staff members from Independence, Stann Creek Ecumenical, and Sacred Heart Junior Colleges. 24 Stann Creek Ecumenical and 12 Independence Jr. College faculty and staff met at SCEJC for a combined workshop on February 14, and 24 Sacred Heart faculty met for the second workshop held on February 16 at SHJC.

Attendees learned online and on-ground teaching strategies, best-practice online design, and metacognitive applications for online learning. The second half of each workshop day focused upon online quality assurance standards and hands-on practice in building out individual, online course content using a standardized template.

On behalf of the faculty, staff, and students of WJC, I want to thank everyone that attended and the many individuals who contributed to the success of the conference.

Day one of the conference was called to order by the Mistress of Ceremonies, Mrs. Anne Palacio. The program began with the National Anthem of the USA played by the Wesley College band and then followed by the Belizean Anthem song by the Wesley College Choir. Reverent C. David Goff led the invocation, his Lordship the Mayor of Belize City Darrell Bradley brought greetings as did the Chair of the WJC Board of Management, Bishop Roosevelt Papouloute. The COBEC Co-chairs, Dr. Karen Martinez and Dr. Emilia Hodge welcomed the attendees and the Hon. Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Education, Youth and Sports, Patrick Faber, provided the Keynote Address.

Presentations were provided by Dr. Eve Aird (The Evolution of Tertiary Education and the Role of COBEC); Dr. Angel Call and Nigel Encalada (The Need

for a National Research Council); Mark Usher (PROTO Foundation and People Reaching Out to Others); Kevin Geban (Tourism Training at the Tertiary Level in Belize); Mayor Darrel Bradley (Law and Education in Belize); Dr. Carly Womack-Wynne with Deryck Satchwell and Jeanne Link (Collaborating to build Quality Assurance Capacity in Belize); and Dr. Larry Daniels (Facilitating Follow-up on Strategic Planning).

Dr. Emilia Hodge called the Business Meeting to order on day two and the standing committees met to discuss a variety of initiatives. Dr. Sharmayne Saunders reported on work of the College Administrators/ Faculty Experience (CAFÉ) Committee; Jeanne Link reported College Fair Committee (CFC); and Dr. Nancy Adamson and Dr. Eve Aird reported on the Study Abroad Committee (SAC). Additionally, the University of Illinois at Chicago was admitted as a new member of COBEC and the venues for the following future COBEC Conferences were confirmed: Summer 2018: Bossier Parish Community College, LA; Winter 2019: San Pedro Junior College, BZ (February 6 College Fair, and February 7-8 Conference; Summer 2019: University of North Florida, FL; Winter 2020: University of the West Indies - Open Campus, BZ; and Summer 2020: Northeast Wisconsin Technical College, WI.

"The Belize International Teaching Experience really goes beyond our conventional thinking of study abroad," said Dr. Bonnie Higginson, regents professor emeritus and director of the Belize International Teaching Experience. "Our students gain experience through working directly with teachers and children in Belize, and those interactions impact the students' perspectives about teaching in diverse settings and meeting the needs of all learners."

Program participants are placed in various schools within Corozal's Roman Catholic public school district. While many of the student teachers have been placed in primary schools, secondary-level student teachers in English, music, agriculture, math and other disciplines have taught at one of two high schools in the district.

To contribute to the program's success, the College of Education and Human Services works with Murray State alumni in the region, including Marga and Carlos Lopez, a married couple from Belize who both earned graduate degrees from Murray State.

"They help us with all of the coordination from Belize," Higginson added. "Marga stays with the students

and takes care of them while they are in Belize, and Carlos is now a lecturer at Murray State. Their son will become a Murray State student next fall."

Meg Black, a participant on the spring 2010 Belize International Teaching Experience, reflected on her time abroad and what she learned in terms of teaching practices and classroom management.

"My biggest takeaway was learning how to teach using different resources," Black said. "In my experience, the teaching in Belize was less dependent upon technology than my student-teaching experience in the States had been. This was immensely helpful in preparing me for this past year when I worked for a new school that didn't have many resources. Because I was comfortable teaching without technology, it wasn't a problem. My lead teacher in Belize also used projects-based learning, and I use many of the strategies I learned with her in my own classroom today."

As for the Murray State students who participate in this education abroad program, there is no doubt that a lasting impression is made on them both professionally and personally.

"In my experience, the teaching in Belize was less dependent upon technology than my student-teaching experience in the States had been. This was immensely helpful in preparing me for this past year when I worked for a new school that didn't have many resources. Because I was comfortable teaching without technology, it wasn't a problem..."


