Jim Broxton, President of the SGA, is proposing a student commission to investigate the prevailing lack of spirit which the students of this institution display.

Weekend moonlight hikes, hot dog roasts, informal parties all cost time and effort on the part of the students but wouldn't they be fun? If the students take the first step, the faculty would be more than willing to lend a helping hand in any possible, (this offer came directly from a faculty member).

How many times have you heard that, "I'm going home and do nothing because it's too boring around here"? This attitude of not participating seems to point out that the students concerned are just too immature to be in college and away from home.

They have to be constantly entertained rather than foraging for themselves. The next time that you sit around on a dull weekend remember it is your own fault just as well as everyone else's.

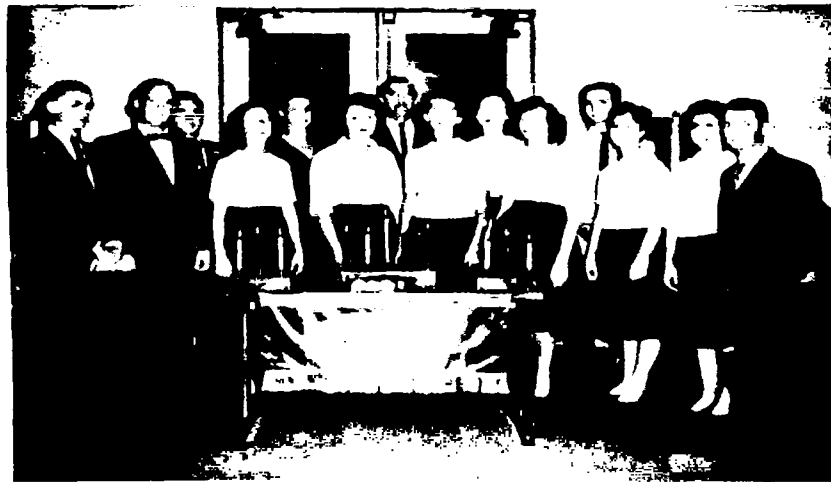

manities and all fields of specialization to be found in the undergraduate college.

President J. R. Thaxton has named Dr. J. A. Durrenberger as the Liaison Officer to nominate to the Danforth Foundation two or not to exceed three candidates for these 1960 fellowships. These appointments are fundamentally "a relationship of encouragement" throughout the years of graduate study, carrying a promise of financial aid within prescribed conditions as there may be need.

The maximum annual grant for single Fellows is \$1500 plus tuition and fees charge to all graduate students; for married Fellows, \$2000 plus tuition and fees charged to all graduate students with an additional stipend of \$500 for each child. Students with or without financial need are invited to apply.

A Danforth Fellow is allowed to carry other scholarship appointments, such as Rhodes, Fulbright, Woodrow Wilson, Marshall, etc., concurrently with his Danforth Fellowship, and applicants for these appointments are cordially invited to apply at the same time for a Danforth Fellowship.

If a man received the Danforth Appointment, together with a Rhodes Scholarship, Fulbright Scholarship, or Woodrow Wilson Fellowship, he becomes a Danforth Fellow without stipend, until these other relationships are completed.

All Danforth Fellows will participate in the annual Danforth Foundation Conference on Teaching, to be held at Camp Minnawana in Michigan next Sept., 1960.

The qualifications of the candidates as listed in the announcement from the Foundation are: men of outstanding academic ability, personality congenial to the classroom, and integrity and character, including serious inquiry within the Christian tradition.

All applications, including the recommendations, must be completed by January 31, 1960. Any student wishing further information should get in touch with our Liaison officer.
