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




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FSU Presents Play For VSC

Sumerford Visits Japan

Dr. Taylor Sumerford, professor of Chemistry at VSC, delivered a series of lectures on the chemistry of medicinal products at Kyoto University, Japan, during the Winter Quarter. His invitation to join the faculty at Kyoto University resulted from a series of trips he, as a representative of an

American drug concern, made in Asia in the early 1960's in search of research products of possible application in the drug field.

On an informal basis, he also taught classes in English conversation designed for Japanese graduate students who were preparing to come to the United States during the coming year to carry out research in governmental, academic, and industrial laboratories.

Just before leaving Japan, Dr. Sumerford held a seminar for the research staff of Nippon Shinyaku -- a pharmaceutical manufacturer located in Kyoto.

Dr. Sumerford observed that one of the major things which distinguishes the Japanese as a race is their willingness and capacity to exert a sustained effort to achieve whatever goal is before them. This trait carries one into the classroom, which, coupled with the fact that Kyoto and other imperial universities in Japan accept only one out of some twenty applicants who apply for admission, a very satisfying

"In its 16 year history, THEATER UNDER THE STARS has been a springboard for many aspiring actors and actresses, and it has proved an invaluable training ground in exposing good talent to the rigors of professional theater," Mr. Mattson added.

All members of the Chorus will be paid \$110.00 per week and will become a member of Actors Equity Association, the American professional actors union.

There were 700 applicants for the show with 450 in competition, and there were estimated to be 100,000 viewers.

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
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


