## Harvest In South Georgia

In 1998, the rich muck farms along Lake Apopka (central Floric closed due to a State of Florida buy-out and environmental clea up which drained the lake. 2,500 farmworkers lost their jobs. T exhibit describes the life and work of those farmworkers. Their story is also a larger story about migrant and seasonal farmwork throughout the Southeast whose labors continue to put food of our tables and whose culture is **changing the face of the region**.

In 1999, Zellwin Farms, which had recently closed its large muck farm near Apopka, Florida, opened a \$2 million vegetable packing house east of Lake Park, Georgia. In July 2001, Coggin Farms and Produce of Lake Park bought the facility. Like **most farms in South Georgia, Coggins is staffed by migrant labor from Mexico and Central America**. Most workers migrate for economic reasons, taking **jobs that no one else wants**.

"If we didn't have migrant workers we wouldn't be in this business. Mexicans first question is 'How much can we work? Locals ask, 'What time do we go home?'" Anthony Coggins, farmer, Echols County
