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

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Does foam burn?



OR: WHAT IS HAPPENING TO MY SET?

DOES foam burn???

Indeed it does! In spite of a demonstration at a Convention workshop. One in which I held my own lighter to a piece of urethane foam.

Sandra Luker gave us a good workshop on various foams. Among other things, she passed around a urethane foam cupcake. In reply to a question she said it wouldn't burn. We tried it. It didn't.

Yet, when I took a piece home, and a co-worker put a match to it, it went like crazy!!!

WHY? What was the difference?
I can only guess. When urethane
foam cures, a thin skin is formed
on the outside. This was the way
the "cupcake" was. The foam was
poured into the mold, set aside, and
allowed to cure. When we applied
a flame, it smoked a bit, but went
out when the flame was removed.

But my piece that burned didn't have that skin. Sandra mixed some foam for me to play with. I wanted to see if I could make a rough, rock-

like piece with a flat back that could be glued to a flat.

I poured the foam on aluminum foil, and as it was curing, disturbed the surface with a stick. The result, a beautiful "rock" about an inch thick, with a flat back.

But no skin. Apparently, it's the skin that retards burning. Because when we applied a flame, it BURNED? ??

And when foam burns, not only does it go like mad, THE FUMES ARE TOXICT

Should we not use foam? I don't know. But if we do, we'd damn well better know what we're dealing with. There are a lot of different foams. I wouldn't attempt to generalize. But test the one you're going to use. Then decide if it will be safe in your circumstances.

Lailah Feldman, T&G President, was in charge of all the hooplah. If she wanted to, Lailah could hire out as a consultant to other groups planning such events.


