A GATHERING OF PLAYERS

The planning for the annual Conven-

tion goes on all year long. Program Chairman Rick Rose has been hard at work ever since the '78 Convention. A weak heart is not an asset. Just a few weeks ago Rick got word that the History Village Inn in Athens had been sold and the new management had not been informed by the old management that GTC was booked in for '79. That meant a mad dash to Athens to renegotiate the contract.

Things sometimes work out, though. Rick says we've got a better deal now than the one we had. Room rates are probably the best we've had in some time: \$16 single, \$18 double, \$20 for three or four. (No more than four to a room.) Also, some of the meeting rooms are being remodeled and the facilities should be even better than the ones we inspected.

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

ing cocktail party.

On Tuesday, after seeing the Changing of the Guard, the West End and Piccadilly Circus, and Westminster Abbey, we'll have an afternoon visit to a London theatre for a talk on British (particularly London) theatre. Tuesday night, performance at a West End theatre.

Wednesday, on to Oxford and Stratford-upon-Avon. Following tours, a performance of one of Will's plays at the Royal Shakespear Theatre.

Thursday, a behind-the-scenes visit

and an evening performance.

Friday, sightseeing and a performance at the Festival Theatre in Chinchester.

Saturday, a matinee and in the evening at dinner, a guest speaker.

The dates set for the Four Arts Convention will be either January 17, 18, 19, or January 25, 26, 27, 1980.



What is Georgia Volunteer Lawyers for the Arts, Inc.?

Georgia Volunteer Lawyers for the Arts (GVLA) is a nonprofit, tax-exempt organization founded in 1975 to assist people in the arts and arts organizations by providing free legal services. Five Atlanta attorneys serve as GVLA's Board of Directors and are responsible for policy and operations.

How is GVLA funded?

GVLA has received grants from the Atlanta Bar Association, the City of Atlanta Bureau of Cultural Affairs and the Georgia Council for the Arts and Humanities. GVLA accepts donations, and all contributions are tax-deductible.

Who are the volunteer lawyers?

GVLA has on its roster over 100 attorneys in the Atlanta area who have volunteered their services free of charge. GVLA is expanding its list of attorneys to include volunteers around the state.

How does GVLA work?

An artist or arts organization with a legal question or problem may call GVLA at (404) 892-8246. After determining the client's eligibility for free legal services, the GVLA staff will ask one of the volunteer lawyers who has indicated to GVLA that he handles the legal area in question to take the case. If the attorney agrees, the client is instructed to make an appointment with the attorney. Once the referral has been made by GVLA, a normal attorney-client relationship proceeds. GVLA acts only as a referral agency for clients.

What kinds of legal problems does GVLA deal with?

GVLA will refer only those legal questions which are directly related to a client's artistic pursuits. For example, GVLA does not usually handle divorces or most criminal matters. GVLA attorneys have assisted artists to copyright music and art works; negotiate gallery or recording contracts; incorporate non-profit community arts organizations, chamber music groups, theatre companies, etc. Our volunteers have helped artists and dance companies with studio leases and given advice on tax matters.

How does an artist or arts organization qualify for GVLA help?

First, the client's legal problem must be directly related to the arts. Second, the client must be unable to afford a lawyer. GVLA has financial guidelines which must be met. Any financial information received by GVLA is confidential.

How much does it cost to use GVLA's services?

A GVLA client pays no attorneys' fees. However, a client is expected to bear the cost of out-of-pocket expenses which are incurred in the handling of his case. These expenses may include long distance calls, court or government filing fees.

Can GVLA help me find out how the law affects me as an artist?

Yes. GVLA's Board of Directors has participated in and conducted workshops on arts law subjects. GVLA is involved in other activities designed to educate artists and arts organizations on their legal rights and responsibilities.

Is GVLA restricted to the Atlanta area?

No. GVLA accepts clients and makes referrals from all around Georgia and welcomes calls and letters from outside the metro Atlanta area.



The surplus is maintained in warehouses in each state. The official title of the garage sale is the Federal Surplus Personal Property Donation Program and it's run by the GSA. I've learned a few other interesting things at the hospitality suites at past Conventions. Hopefully, I've been able to impart an intelligence or two.


