# CSU's Hazel Hall Wins This Year's Leighton Ballew Award

The Leighton Ballew Award for Oustanding Service to theatre in Georgia is the highest honor given by the Georgia Theatre Conference. This year's winner, Dr. Hazel Hall of the Columbus State University Theatre, was recognized by her colleague and friend Brenda May. Even as Brenda stood up to start her speech, Dr. Hall thought that she had been asked to come to the awards banquet in order to present the award to someone else. Ms.May's presentation proved to be appropriate and thorough report of Dr. Hall's achievements and support of theatre in general, and of the Georgia Theatre Conference in particular. The text of her speech appears below:

I have the honor of presenting a very special award tonight to a very special person. I'd like to share just a few of her accomplishments with you.

Originally from Alabama, this professional director, teacher and mentor was educated at Huntingdon College for her B. A. degree: at The University of Iowa for her M. A., and at the University of Missouri for her Ph.D. She has directed around the southeast and nationally, including being the first professional director in the United States to direct and outdoor drama.


Before coming to Columbus State University in 1974, she taught at the University of Missouri and at Georgia Southern University. In 1982 she became chair of the CSU Department of Theatre, where she has successfully led this department to its current status. She has worked to help us grow to five full-time faculty, plus adjunct, and from a department with only a Bachelor of Arts degree to one which also offers a Bachelor of Fine Arts and a Bachelor of Science in Education—the only such degree offered in the state system. She trains our students in directing, playwrighting, and hteatre history. She not only directs, but still occasionally designs and costumes.

But she hasn't been busy just at CSU. She has been active in Georgia Theatre Conference since 1974, serving as audition coordinator in 1975 and 1980; as College/University Division Chair in 1976-77; Vice-President in 1977-78; and President in 1978-79. She is also active in SETC where she has served on numerous committees throughout the years: as secretary from 1981-1983 and as President in 1984-85.

I feel very fortunate to call her not only my boss, but my very good friend and one of the most generous people I have ever known or worked with. Ladies and gentlemen—this year's Leighton Ballew Award goes to Columbus State University's Dr. Hazel Hall.

#### COLUMBUS STATE UNIVERSITY DEPARTMENT OF THEATRE

The Columbus State University Department of Theatre offers the Bachelor of Science in Education (B.S.Ed.) and the Bachelor of Fine Arts (B.F.A.) as well as a Minor in Theatre. With the B.S.Ed. and teacher certification, our graduates are qualified to teach drama, preschool through 12<sup>th</sup> grade. With the B.F.A., our graduates can go into professional or community theatre or higher education. Students majoring in other areas can opt to take Theatre Minors tailored to fit their major curriculum.

The CSU Theatre offers a comprehensive undergraduate foundation in theatre, including acting, directing, lighting, computer-aided design, scene design, costume design, stage movement, and children's theatre as well as courses in dance and musical theatre. Our program is small so our undergraduates get hands-on experience in a variety of areas. Our majors receive a solid foundation for their future careers in educational, professional, or community theatre

Columbus State University, an urban university with approximately 6,000 students, has modern facilities and a pleasant campus in Georgia's second largest city. The CSU Department of Theatre is the only program in Georgia offering the Bachelor of Science in Education (B.S.Ed.) and teacher certification in Drama. Our graduates are teaching in elementary, middle, high schools, and colleges throughout the State of Georgia and the Southeast. Currently, we have five full-time faculty members as well as staff members and adjunct faculty.

Columbus State University has a Fine Arts Hall auditorium, a proscenium-arch theatre seating over 600, and an experimental theatre, seating approximately 100. Future renovations to the existing facilities are expected within the next two years. The CSU Department of Theatre also has a modern computer lab and courses in computer-aided design. All seniors are expected to put their resumes and portfolios, including acting, designs, teaching, and other supporting materials on CD-ROM in preparation for their search for jobs and/or graduate programs.

Columbus State University's theatre program is dedicated to providing quality theatre experiences to young audiences. The Theatre for Young Audiences mounts full stage productions as well as smaller ensemble touring productions that travel to area schools. This program is education-based, providing teachers and leaders with researched study guides for classroom activities and use. Our CSU theatre faculty and students, as well as area school children, all benefit from the opportunity of exposing young audiences to live theatre as well as building audiences of tomorrow.

Along with full stage productions and ensemble touring shows, our theatre education students have the opportunity to teach and work with young people by teaching creative dramatics in after school programs and at youth detention centers. Our students also have the opportunity to work as teaching assistants for the Springer Children's Theatre workshops.

An extensive number of scholarships are available to students who meet the criteria determined by individual scholarship sources. The Financial Aid Office can assist you in identifying those Scholarships for which you might be eligible. A major source of student Scholarship monies is the HOPE Scholarship. Funded by the Georgia lottery, HOPE (Help Outstanding

Pupils Educationally) is a state-sponsored gift aid program. Recipients must meet academic requirements, and must have been identified as HOPE recipients by their high schools. College sophomores, juniors, and seniors who are eligible for HOPE, will be notified by the Financial Aid Office.

Students wishing to receive departmental scholarships or assistantships must be admitted to the University as a declared theatre major and must maintain an academically sound standing within the department.

<u>Departmental Scholarships</u>: Each year, in conjunction with the Annual Interviews, the theatre faculty award departmental scholarships to both incoming as well as continuing students. The actual amounts of these awards vary; generally, they fall between the amount of full-tuition to one-third of tuition costs.

Endowed Scholarships: In addition to the above, the theatre program has two outside sources of scholarship money. Those sources are The Springer Theatre's Bill Evans Memorial Scholarship (students who have reached Sophomore status are eligible) and Emily Woodruff Scholarship.

Assistantships: Financial support from the department also comes in the form of actual work assignments. Students assistants are regularly hired to work in the Scene and Costume shops.

Federal Work-Study Program: Students who qualify for the program are permitted to work in an approved part-time job and earn a specific amount of money, normally between \$700 and \$2,100 per year. An award is made for a specific period, and job assignments are based on ability, interest, major, and needs of the university.

Regular Student Assistant Program: A limited number of part-time positions are available to students through various campus departments. Applications should be made directly to the Career Center. Opportunities under these programs are based on university work needs.

Off-Campus Jobs: Listings of many part-time job opportunities (as well as full-time) are available in the Career Office. Often, employers who call jobs in to the center are willing to allow a student flexibility in order to work around class schedules.

This year's season includes Brian Friel's Dancing at Lushnasa, Moliere's School for Wives, Pinocchio Commedia, and the musical Anything Goes. In addition to the main season student directed one-act plays will be presented.

As you are planning your future and selecting a college/university, we encourage you to visit many campuses and find the best fit for you. The faculty at CSU will be auditioning incoming freshmen for scholarships in the Spring of 2001 on the CSU campus. If you would like to visit and audition, please contact any faculty or CSU Theatre Department secretary, Deb Moore, for an appointment.
